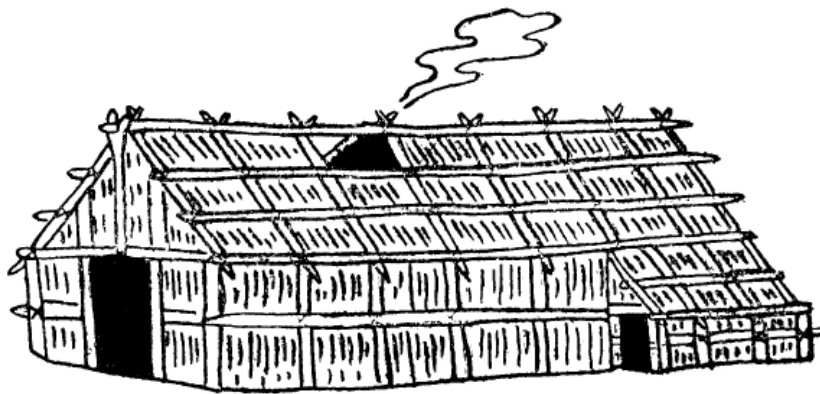

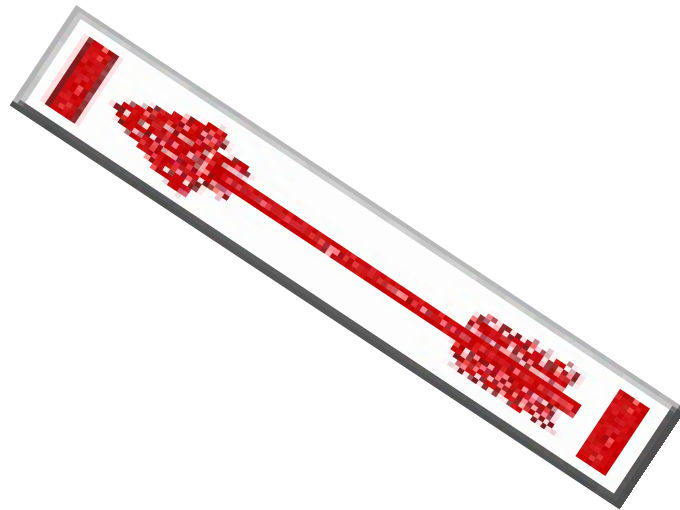

# **Conclave Evaluation:**

## **Areas Needing Improvement:**

Training – The training sessions need more of a variation. The number of sessions aimed at younger members needs to be increased.

Shows – The general consensus of the members in attendance was that the opening show on Friday evening needed improvement. Suggestions included something more entertaining, rather than a traditional ceremony.

Activities – There was a lack of flare in the inter-lodge competitions, leading to a poor turnout. In the future more emphasis should be placed on these events to encourage friendly competition and a chance for fellowship between lodges.

College Facilities – Having the college was a great advantage, however in the future we should take better advantage of the facilities and maximize our use of them.

VIP's – We need to plan further in advance to attempt to get some VIP's to attend the conclave. Other alternatives need to be looked at when the National and Regional officers are unable to attend.

## **Outstanding Areas:**

College Facilities/Dorms – Having the college facilities and dorm rooms added a comfortable and highly enjoyable atmosphere to the conclave.

Registration – The new computer registration system made the process fast and easy.

Publications – The newsletter crew put out 3 excellent newsletters during the weekend.

Patch Auction – The auction was well announced and pulled in a larger than expected amount of revenue.

American Indian Affairs – The flute making demonstrations and hands-on participation added a unique aspect to the conclave. Our keynote speaker, a storyteller from the Mohawk Indians, also added great entertainment and a unique experience.
